# What's the (re)use?

Re-use of anything reusable means less material and energy used; that means less pollution, and therefore helps mitigate climate change. We can all participate! This is an exchange program: you bring it in, we make it available to others!

Right now, our co-op has these possibilities for re-use:

### On the Sales Floor

Ex-cons: Glass, plastic and metal containers. People can bring them in (CLEAN AND DRY, WITH LIDS) and place them in a labeled basket by the exit door. (Also welcome are brown paper bags, plastic bags, and coffee bags.) They are taken to the basement, where I inspect them carefully. Those that have passed inspection are placed in locations on the sales floor where anyone can take one and use it in the Co-op or take it home.

<u>Paper Bags, Plastic Bags, and Coffee Bags</u>: Bags that have passed inspection are placed in a designated spot near the new bags.

#### In the Basement

The Co-op has a large, dry, finished basement. Ask a staff person where to find:

Egg cartons (tell your chicken-raising friends!); small and large plastic buckets and jugs; canning jars; spice jars; large cans; insulated boxes.

#### On the Front Porch

Weather permitting, we often have available items that are generated here at the Co-op:

Bags of 'peanuts' and bubble wrap from packaging; small buckets and jugs; large plastic bags; other items we no longer need.

My name is Link, and I speak for the ex-cons (experienced containers) that our Co-op loves.



We welcome donations and have a receptacle for them by the exit door. Please follow our rules, or we will have to place your items in the recycling or the trash.

- 1. All donations must be clean and dry.
- 2. No stickiness from label on outside of container.
- 3. Labels may remain on containers.
- 4. Containers must have lids.
